

BUTZTOWN ROAD REALIGNMENT PROJECT

Lower Nazareth Township has been awarded \$725,000 from the Pennsylvania DCED Multi-Modal Transportation Grant Program for the Butztown Road Intersection Realignment and Road Rehabilitation project.

Bids have been received for this project and are under review to be awarded in March. Estimated cost is \$1.2 million. Work is estimated to start in the Spring.

SCOPE OF THE PROJECT:

- * Realign the existing intersection splitting into a "T" and a "Y"
- * Replace existing antiquated stormwater pips with new pipes
- * Add a left turning lane on Route 191
- * Guiderails around triangle property to prevent driving through
- * Mill and overlay of Butztown Road from Rt 191 to the Bethlehem Township line.

Butztown Road will be closed between Hecktown Road to the south and Route 191 (Nazareth Pike) to the north for approximately two-three months. A detour will be implemented utilizing Hecktown Road and Route 191 (Nazareth Pike).

While a road closure can be disruptive, it is the opinion of the Township and the Township Engineer that detouring Butztown Road is the safest and most efficient way to reconstruct the intersection and realigned roadway. The roadway closure will eliminate the need for the contractor to work around everyday traffic.

It should be noted that there is an existing truck restriction on Hecktown Road. It is the Township's intention to suspend this restriction for the duration of the detour.

The Township may limit access to the nearby Township Park if needed to further facilitate the project.

IMPORTANT INFORMATION ON DETENTION PONDS

It is a misconception that detention ponds are owned by the Township. The property owner is responsible for the maintenance of the detention pond that is on their property. At a minimum, maintenance includes mowing, clearing of debris, and sinkhole repair.

In addition, detention ponds are private property. They are meant to control stormwater runoff and are not for recreation/play. Please instruct your children to stay out of the detention ponds.

GET YOUR REAL ID

Beginning May 7th, Pennsylvanians will need a REAL ID-compliant driver's license/photo ID card, (or another form of federally-acceptable identification like a valid passport or military ID) to board a domestic commercial flight or enter a federal building or military installation that requires ID. REAL ID is a federal law regarding how states issue driver's licenses and ID cards to ensure they are acceptable for federal purposes. The cards feature new technology, making them much more difficult to forge.

Getting a REAL ID is optional, but if you're not sure whether a REAL ID is right for you, PennDOT's <u>REAL ID online wizard</u> at https://www.pa.gov/agencies/dmv/driver-services/real-id-for-me.html can help. More information on necessary documents and where and how to obtain a REAL ID is at https://www.pa.gov/agencies/dmv/driver-services/real-id.html.

Pennsylvanians can apply at any time up to or after the enforcement deadline.

ROAD PROJECTS & IMPROVEMENTS

ROUTE 191 & NEWBURG ROAD INTERSECTION UPDATE

As many of our residents are aware, Lower Nazareth Township has partnered with PennDOT for this project. Lower Nazareth agreed to procure the necessary right-of-way for the widening project. PennDOT is proposing left-turning lanes with signalized left-turn traffic lights. PennDOT will handle the actual construction. The Township worked diligently to procure the necessary right-of-way. The Township has secured the four corners at Newburg Road and Route 191 as well as at Daniels Road and Route 191.

The Board is excited as this project continues to move forward as the widening and improvement of these intersections have been necessary for a long time! This PADOT project is in the final design stage through Spring of 2026. Construction is estimated to begin in Summer 2026.





ROUTE 248 TRAFFIC SIGNAL IMPROVEMENTS

In 2022, Lower Nazareth Township was awarded \$256,000 by PennDOT for upgrading the traffic lights along the Route 248 corridor. This congested corridor is consistently buzzing with traffic.

The upgrade to the lights will include new controller components and it will provide Penn-DOT with remote access, which can adjust the light cycles based on traffic flow as well as emergency conditions.

The grant is for the six lights in Lower Nazareth from the intersection of Jandy Blvd to the intersection with Corriere Road. The project will begin this Spring as should be completed in about two weeks.

Lower Nazareth Township was the only municipality in the Lehigh Valley to get awarded funding under this grant program and we are thrilled PennDOT saw the value in this project!

2025 ROAD PROJECT

This year's proposed road paving bid represents a total of 7 roads for mill and overlay. The Township plans to award a paving contract for the following:

Presidential Drive Eisenhower Drive Madison Drive Kennedy Court

Jefferson Drive Frank Street Delores Street



The project went out to bid the end of February. Depending on the contractor's schedule, we plan for the project to commence late Spring / Early Summer.

PUBLIC WORKS CORNER

TOWNSHIP ROADSIDE TREE TRIMMING

As years go by many changes take place and we may or may not take notice to small things. One of these things is the maturity of trees located roadside. These trees can cause many issues such as limbs hanging out into the roadway and impaired sight distance when trying to pull out of intersections.

When wet or covered in snow and ice, branches can hang low causing traffic to drive around them into oncoming traffic or drive under them causing damage to vehicles, including township trucks. When township trucks are trying to remove snow from the road and branches are low, the branches cause damage to overhead lights, mirrors and the side of truck.

While a tree may be out of the township right-of-way, the branches are encroaching into the right-of-way and the roadway. Moving forward, as their schedule permits, the Public Works Department will be conducting roadside tree trimming to remove these obstructions. Public Works will trim back to the right-of-way at a height that is deemed safe for cars and trucks to pass safely. Again, there is no start or end date on this work. It will be done as their schedule permits. Roads done first will be chosen by severity of overgrowth. If you have any questions, please feel free to contact us at 610-759-7434.



KNOW YOUR FLOOD TERMS

Flood Warning

• A Flood Warning is issued when flooding is imminent or occurring. Immediate action is needed to protect yourself and others.



• Remember: flooding can happen quickly, so stay vigilant and prepared.

Flood Watch

- A Flood Watch means conditions are favorable for flooding, but flooding has not yet occurred.
- A watch is issued to give you time to prepare—stay alert, monitor local news and weather, and be ready to act if flooding develops.
- Keep your emergency kit handy and have a plan in place for quick action.

Flood Advisory

- A Flood Advisory is issued when flooding is expected to cause significant inconvenience but may not be life-threatening.
- Although it's not an emergency, take precautions to minimize damage or risk, such as staying indoors during heavy rain or avoiding flooded roads.
- It's a reminder to remain cautious, as floodwaters can still pose risks to safety and property.



CAT & DOG POPULATION CONTROL AND PET CARE SPAY OR NEUTER YOUR PET & LOCAL CLINICS

Spaying and neutering is one of the greatest gifts you can provide your pet, your family, and your community. Not only are you controlling pet overpopulation, but spaying and neutering may also prevent medical and behavioral problems, allowing your pet to lead a longer, healthier, and happier life.

The Center for Animal Health and Welfare (CAHW) is committed to helping to decrease the population of homeless pets in our area. The Center for Animal Health & Welfare offers a comprehensive spay/neuter program that allows for *low-cost surgeries for feral and stray cats*. In addition, low-income families are also welcome to use these services for their family pets. This program benefits all of the Center's animals since all animal are spayed or neutered before they are adopted from the shelter.

CAHW also offers low cost vaccinations for dogs and cats, heartworm and lyme testing for dogs, Felv/FIV testing for cats, microchip identification, and worm and flea treatments.

These services are by appointment only, and fees vary depending on the type and size of the animal. Please call 610-252-7722 Ext. 8 for scheduling and pricing information. Leave a detailed message with your contact information and the scheduler will return your call within 3 business days.

No Nonsense Neutering's (NNN) mission is to end over-population of cats and dogs by providing quality and affordable spay-neuter services. They offer spay-neuter for pet cats and dogs, spay-neuter for cat and dog rescues and shelters, and provide Trap Neuter Return resources throughout our service areas.

There are no income or residency requirements to use No Nonsense Neutering clinics. All healthy cats and dogs 12 weeks and older are eligible for surgery. Please visit their website www.nnnlv.org for additional details including the fee schedule. There is also detailed information on their Trap Neuter and Release (TNR) Program including renting humane traps, animal care, and release after surgery.

ANIMAL CONTROL AND PROPER WASTE DISPOSAL



Pursuant to Township Ordinance #135, it is unlawful to allow dogs to run at large or allow your dog to habitually bark. Be considerate of your neighbors, keep control of your dog at all times. In addition, don't forget to clean up after your dog when you're on a walk. Please dispose of that waste in your private trash can and not your neighbors.

The Township's contract with Pibbles Paws is no longer in place. If you see a lost or stray dog, please contact Northampton County Non-Emergency at 610-759-2200. Do not call 911.

DOG LICENSES...IT'S THE LAW

State law requires all dogs over 3 months of age to be licensed. Owners of unlicensed dogs are subject to fines up to \$300.00. Licenses are valid for the county in which the owner resides. FINANCIAL CORNER

REAL ESTATE TAXES

Township residents will receive *three* real estate tax bills each year. Lower Nazareth Township receives 5.50 mills of tax and Northampton County receives 10.80 mills levied on real estate in the Township. The Nazareth Area School District's real estate tax levy is 58.23 mills. For example, a Township resident with a real estate valuation of \$100,000 in 2025 will pay a total of \$7,453.00 in real estate taxes distributed as

follows:

LOWER NAZARETH TOWNSHIP REAL ESTATE TAX COLLECTOR

Lower Nazareth Township Real Estate tax bills are issued each year in February and cover the calendar year (January through December).

Township resident, Eric Mitcheltree was elected to the position of Real Estate Tax Collector. As of July 2019, Mr. Mitcheltree is **ONLY** collecting the Lower Nazareth Township Real Estate Taxes. If you do not receive or misplace your tax bill, please contact Mr. Mitcheltree at 484-291-1546. Please mail all payments to the address on your tax bill. When mailing your payments, it is important that you provide your phone number on your check. If there is an issue with your payment, you can be contacted in order to correct the problem so that your payment is received on time. If you want a receipt, include both bill copies along with a self-addressed, stamped envelope. The **Lower Nazareth Township Tax Collector's Office** is available by appointment only. NAZARETH AREA SCHOOL DISTRICT REAL ESTATE TAX COLLECTOR

Nazareth Area School District Real Estate tax bills are issued each year in July and are for the school's fiscal year (July of current year through following June). Berkheimer Associates is the collector for school taxes. Payments are made payable to HAB-MISC and can be mailed to PO Box 25144, Lehigh Valley, PA 18002-5144. If you have any questions, please call 610-559-3143 for assistance.

PROPERTY TAX RELIEF—Residents of the Nazareth Area School District may be eligible for a property tax rebate under programs administered by the district. For more information, see page 18 or contact Representative Joe Emrick's district office at 610-746-5090 or Senator Lisa Boscola's district office at 610-868-8667. Staff will be happy to help you determine your eligibility and fill out the appropriate paperwork.

NORTHAMPTON COUNTY REAL ESTATE TAXES

Northampton County Real Estate tax bills are issued each year in January and cover the calendar year (January through December). Northampton County collects their own taxes. Payments are made payable to County of Northampton and can be mailed to PO Box 25008, Lehigh Valley, PA 18002-5008.

For your convenience, The County of Northampton accepts payments at Revenue Locations, either in person or drop box: The Northampton County Government Center, 669 Washington Street, Easton & The Northampton County Human Services Building, 2801 Emerick Blvd, Bethlehem. In addition, payments can be made at any Fulton Bank location within Northampton County.

FINANCIAL CORNER

EARNED INCOME TAXES & OPEN SPACE PRESERVATION

In the Primary Election in May 2019, residents voted in favor of a .25% increase to the Earned Income Tax for Open Space Preservation. In August 2019, the Board of Supervisors adopted an ordinance to increase the earned income tax for that purpose. Therefore, as of January 2020, the earned income tax rate is 1.45%. The additional .25% collected will be segregated into a separate fund, which can be used only for open space preservation.

EARNED INCOME TAXES



One of Lower Nazareth Township's largest source of local revenue is our 1.45% earned income tax, which is split as .7% for the Nazareth Area School District, .25% Open Space Preservation, and .5% for the Township.

Local income tax in Pennsylvania is based upon where you live rather than where you work. Individuals who are self-employed or whose employer doesn't withhold the full 1.45% are required to pay it directly. Penalties will be added if not paid quarterly.

Lower Nazareth Township requires all persons moving into, out of, or within the Township to apply for a Moving Record. Securing a Moving Record allows the Township to document your moving date and forwarding address. This updated information makes processing your tax documents more convenient for you. The fee for a Moving Record is \$5 and may be secured at the Township Office during normal business hours.

Taxpayers with earned income in 2024 are required to file a Tax Return by **Tuesday April 15, 2024**. If you live and work in Pennsylvania, you can e-file on our tax administrator's secure website, which is available 24/7 at www.KeystoneCollects.com.

Keystone Collections Group's e-file is the easy, fast and secure way to file your 2024 tax return. You will need your W-2, KEYSTONE your Social Security Number, and any other income documents that may apply (such as a PA-UE or a Schedule C)



If you have questions regarding local tax filing, visit Keystone's Frequently Asked Questions or call Keystone's Taxpayer Helpline at 1 (866) 539-1100 to speak with a local, knowledgeable Taxpayer Service Agent. You can also email your questions 24/7 to Taxpayer Support. Taxpayer Service Agents try to respond to all online inquiries within three business days.

LOCAL SERVICES TAX

Local Services Tax is collected at the Township Office. Residents that are self-employed and work out of their homes are required to pay the \$52.00 annual tax as long as they make \$12,000.00 or more. Self-employed residents that earn less than \$12,000.00 or have a full-time job outside of Lower Nazareth Township that is withholding the Local Services Tax is required to submit an Exemption Form on an annual basis. Zoning Ordinance Town Hall Meeting

In December 2023, the Lower Nazareth Township Board of Supervisors adopted a comprehensive Township wide update of the Township zoning ordinance and map. The update changed some zoning districts and uses for various properties in the Township; however, was desperately needed in order to replace the existing 2001 zoning ordinance and map. This was accomplished after two years of public meetings and two public hearings!

The Board of Supervisors engaged the services of a professional planning consultant, who worked closely with the Township Planning Commission for a period of two years to prepare the final ordinance and map. The Board of Supervisors and Planning Commission focused on the goals of preserving farmland and open space and maintaining a high quality of life for the residents.

- * Must have a contractor's estimate to apply

SPLASH PAD RULES

The maximum capacity of the splash pad is 75 people; do not overcrowd the splash pad.

Must use access card to enter the splash park.

All persons using the splash park do so at their own risk.

All children under 14 must have adult supervision at all times.

Do not drink the water, as the water in the splash park recirculates.

Water shoes are strongly recommended.

Small children who are not toilet trained must wear swim diapers to enter and play in the splash park.

Please do not change diapers in the splash park.

Evacuate the splash park immediately when severe weather conditions arise.

No covering water fixtures or drains.

No carrying dirt, mud, mulch, rocks and/or sand onto the splash pad.

No climbing on splash park fixtures.

No running or rough play.

No animals.

No food or beverages on the splash pad; no glass permitted.

No bicycles, wheeled shoes, rollerblades, scooters, skates and/or skateboards.

No electrical appliances, including, not limited to radios.

No alcohol, drugs, smoking or vaping.

The splash park is protected by video surveillance.

Lower Nazareth Township is not responsible for lost or stolen property.

Failure to adhere to the rules of use will result in loss of privileges with no refund for the annual permit.

PROPERTY TAX & RENT REBATE PROGRAM



I am sure we are all looking forward to spring as we had quite a cold winter! As always, a reminder that my Bethlehem District Office at 1 E. Broad St, Suite 120 is open Monday-Friday from 9 am -5 pm. Please stop on in or if you wish to set up a specific time to come in, please call us at 610-868-8667. We are always welcoming the opportunity to assist you on state related matters!

The Property Tax and Rent Rebate program's current deadline is June 30, 2025. My office has the applications available and my staff can assist you in completing the application and submitting it for you. The income limit for both homeowners and renters is now \$45,000 with

a maximum rebate of \$1,000. It's important to note when calculating your income for this program, that only half of Social Security benefits, count towards that limit. All other income will be added to that determine financial eligibility. Pennsylvanians over 65, widows or widowers between the ages of 50-64, or individuals who are permanently disabled between the ages of 18-64 that meet the income eligibility can apply.

Did you ever wonder what happens to a lost money order, a forgotten bank account or an uncashed check? The Pennsylvania Treasury is holding more than \$4 billion in cash and other liquid assets that may belong to you.

GRANTS AWARDED CORNER

GRANTS AWARDED FOR EQUIPMENT FOR OUR EMERGENCY SERVICES

The Lower Nazareth Township Board of Supervisors is pleased to announce the Township has been awarded 4 grants that benefit Colonial Regional Police, Hecktown Volunteer Fire, and Bethlehem Township Volunteer Fire EMS through Statewide LSA grants:

Colonial Regional Police—Radios \$521,000

Colonial Regional Police was able to purchase portable radios to be carried by officers and car radios that will be installed in police vehicles. The new radios will be compatible with the new frequency proposed by County 911. The old radios do not have the ability to communicate at the new proposed frequency and once the new County communication frequency is in place they will be obsolete and useless.

Hecktown Volunteer Fire—Training Equipment \$75,000

Our volunteers undergo numerous hours of training prior to achieving the status of firefighter. Training is ongoing and continuous. This training equipment will provide opportunities for our volunteers to engage in different training scenarios due to the versatile nature of the equipment. The equipment will be used in group training sessions with multiple volunteer fire companies across the region as it is common for companies to assist each other with calls.

Bethlehem Township Volunteer Fire EMS (BTVFC) Cardiac Monitor — \$40,000

BTVFC provides ambulance, basic life support, and advanced life support for the community. Having an ambulance service that is properly equipped to meet the needs of Lower Nazareth is a critical component of protecting the health, safety, and welfare of our residents.

Bethlehem Township Volunteer Fire EMD (BTVFC) Power Stretcher - \$50.000

The power stretcher and loading system was secured for BTVFC through the LSA grant program. Ed Moreland, Executive Director of BTVFC EMS said, "We would like to express our deepest thanks to you, your team and all of the Lower Nazareth Township Supervisors for their support and assistance. This equipment will allow us to quickly and safely move patients to the care that they need, as well as decrease the risk of injury to our EMS clinicians. Thank you again for the leadership and support from Lower Nazareth Township. We greatly value our partnership with the community and look forward to many more years to come."



Colonial Regional Police— New Vehicle

Last year, the Township was able to secure a grant in the amount of \$84,917 towards the purchase of a new vehicle for Colonial Regional Police Department.

This was the sixth vehicle procured with grant money in order to help Colonial Regional Police Department maintain a well functioning fleet.

We are currently awaiting decisions on additional grants towards the purchase of a 2025 Ford Interceptor.

Just the Facts... Just the Facts... School District Nazareth School Elementary



We recognize many residents have seen news articles about the Nazareth Area School District's desire to construct a fourth elementary school in Lower Nazareth Township. The Nazareth Area School District School Board held a public meeting in January where they cordially invited the elected officials from the participating municipalities to attend. Supervisors Steve Brown, Nancy Teague, and James Pennington attended the meeting.

During the course of this meeting, the school presented a projection of 1,000 new students from grades K-12, which would require additional elementary school space. They stated Lower Nazareth Township would be the logical location for the new school since a majority of the enrollment was projected from there. Accordingly, the school district displayed a map with three potential sites for the new school. The problem...none of the sites are zoned to allow a public school. The projected estimate for the acquisition of the land and the construction of the new school is \$70 million. The school board stated they proposed to pay for the new school with an increase in the school property tax every year for the next five years by 3.28%.

The Lower Nazareth Township Board of Supervisors discussed the proposal to rezone the property at the corner of Hecktown Road and Country Club Road, which seems to be the school's preferred location. Currently, the property is zoned agricultural, which under the zoning ordinance is intended for the preservation of agricultural lands and woodlands and to encourage conservation of open space. The Board of Supervisors publicly stated they spent a significant period of time working on the new zoning map and ordinance; therefore, they were not inclined to change the zoning. They instead encouraged the school district to locate a property that is properly zoned for a public school.

At their January 22nd meeting, the Board of Supervisors authorized the Township Manager to correspond with the school district on the Township's position regarding the school board's elementary school proposal. A copy of the letter is on the Township website and the content of the letter is as follows:

TO: Superintendent Resende

On behalf of the Board of Supervisors, I want to thank you and the other members of the school board for the warm invitation to attend your meeting on January 14, 2025. The Lower Nazareth Township Board of

Supervisors firmly believes that open communication is a great tool in solving issues before the Township.

In addition to myself, Supervisor Teague, Supervisor Brown, and Supervisor Pennington were able to attend the meeting and hear the presentation on the need for an additional elementary school. During the course of the presentation, there were some issues that were raised that my Board requested I share their concerns with you.

The first issue of concern was the new residential home count. The presentation listed three current pending residential subdivision plans that were submitted for the same property; however, in the presentation, the home count for all three plans was added together as if all three plans would come to fruition. I responded to your analyst yesterday with a list of the current pending residential subdivision plans.

The second issue that has caused concern with my Board members is the locations selected by the school board for the construction of a new elementary school. All three locations are not zoned to permit a public school by right. The Township has been informed that the school district does not find this to be a barrier, and they have been advised that they possess legal standing to circumvent the Lower Nazareth Township zoning ordinance and map.

The Township is guided by the decision in <u>School District of Philadelphia v. Zoning Board of Adjustment</u>, <u>City of Philadelphia</u>, a Pennsylvania Supreme Court case decided in 1965, which determined a municipality has the police power of zoning and a school district has limited powers which are set forth in the Public School Code of 1949, which does not include the power of land use regulations, which is reserved for municipalities. Additionally, we point to a more recent case, <u>Northampton Area School District v. East Allen Township</u>, which is a Commonwealth Court case decided in 2003. The court clearly opined that recent authority does not support preeminence of a school district. <u>See Ogontz; Council Rock Sch. Dist. v. Wrightstown Zoning Hearing Board</u> (Pa. Cmmwlth 1998).

The East Allen Twp case clearly demonstrates the court's rationale that a school must comply with the local zoning and Section 702 of the School Code does not grant the school district the power of preeminence over local zoning ordinances.

As the Board of Supervisors stated previously, they spent at least two years reviewing and crafting their new zoning ordinance and map with a priority emphasis on preserving and protecting farmland and natural Resources. The parcels you have identified are not zoned for a public school. The Board encourages you to look at properties within the Township that are appropriately zoned for a public school. The Township wants to work with the school district; however, this does not mean the Board is prepared to rezone properties to accommodate the school district as this would be contradictory to their mission to protect and preserve farmland and the natural resources of the Township.

The Board of Supervisors hopes this can be an ongoing conversation and looks forward to the next school board meeting in March where this topic will be addressed.




The Memorial Library of Nazareth and Vicinity is planning an exciting spring and fabulous summer for residents of Lower Nazareth Township!

Acceptable Material: BRUSH AND COMPOST ITEMS SHALL BE KEPT SEPARATE.

Brush (natural/untreated): 8-inch diameter max and no longer than 8 feet; bushes – No Roots Please!

Compost Items: Hedge trimmings, garden residue & leaves – loose or in brown paper bags. NO PLASTIC BAGS!

Unacceptable Material: Grass clippings*, ornamental grass, sod, soil, straw or hay, and plastic bags!

*Lower Nazareth Township supports the position of the State Department of Environmental Protection and strongly recommends recycling your grass clippings by using a mulching mower. Please visit the DEP website for more information on this topic.

Special Instructions: All material must be thoroughly checked for any foreign objects (nails, wire, stones, etc.). Material with debris will not be accepted as it may harm the processing equipment!

BY-PRODUCTS / MULCH AND COMPOST

When available, a supply of the mulch and compost products derived from the FRCA recycling process will be on hand. We strongly encourage our residents to utilize these products.

First Regional Compost Authority (FRCA) – In addition to our local program, a secondary drop off site known as the First Regional Compost Authority (FRCA) is available for Township Residents to utilize.

The facility is located at 6701 Weaversville Road, Northampton, PA 18067. The FRCA operates under its own schedule. Current hours are listed on their website www.frcaweb.org. Hours are subject to change. Please call 610-262-1000 to confirm hours and for any questions.

CURBSIDE ORGANIC WASTE REMOVAL PROGRAM

Lower Nazareth Township will again be providing a curbside organic waste removal program. The Township will run this program for two weeks in the spring so that residents have a way of cleaning up their yard and providing an easy means of disposal for yard waste.



The program will begin on **Monday April 21st** and run until **Friday May 2nd**. Crews will cycle through the Township numerous times during this two-week time period. Please place materials at the curb no later than **Thursday May 1st**. Materials placed by the curb on May 3rd may be missed.

We will be utilizing our leaf vacuum machines for this operation. Acceptable material will consist of leaves and garden residue. **No animal feces, sticks, or dirt.**

Organic bulk waste removal is offered (during two-week period only) as a "call in" program. Residents wishing to use this service will need to call the Township at 610-759-7434 to arrange pickup. We will not accept items such as tree stumps, grass clippings, roots, or dirt.

Bulk items must be set to curb using on of the following methods:

- Place in any open container
- Bundled with cotton or hemp twine. Bundles shall be no larger than 3'x3'x3' & weigh no more than 40lbs
- Placed in compostable paper bags

* All refrigerated appliances must be de-freonized by a certified technician and tagged accordingly.

Appliances without tags will not be accepted.

Examples of appliances containing refrigerant are refrigerators, coolers, de-humidifiers and air conditioners.

Some tips on preparing your material for disposal:

- separate any plastic and metal parts from toys, household items, etc.
- remove glass from storm doors and windows
- clean all wood products of foreign material (nails, drywall, etc.)

We thank you for your cooperation and look forward to a successful Clean-up Day!

MANDATORY CURBSIDE RECYCLING

Curbside recycling collection is mandatory for all residential properties and commercial establishments throughout the Township. Lower Nazareth Township has notified known trash haulers of the recycling requirements. If you are uncertain if your hauler collects recyclables, please contact them directly. Source separation and preparation for recycling of the materials is up to the hauler. The recycled materials shall be separated from regular trash and placed at the curb or prescribed area for collection.

The Township ordinance establishes a minimum list of required recyclables. Those items are:

• Clear, brown and green glass



- Aluminum and bi-metal (tin cans) containers
- Plastic containers:

Pet no. 1: soft drink, water, salad dressing containers, etc.

HDPE no. 2: milk jugs, juice bottles, detergent, motor oil containers, etc.

Newspapers, corrugated paper (boxes), cardboard (cereal box, etc.), and magazines

Although our ordinance does not mandate recycling of plastic numbers 3, 4, 5, 6, and 7 it is your option to recycle those items if your hauler accepts them. Some examples are:

- V(vinyl) or pvc no. 3: window cleaner, detergent bottles, shampoo bottles, cooking oil bottles
- ◆ LDPE(low density polyethylene) no. 4: squeezable bottles; bread, frozen food, and shopping bags
- **PP (polypropylene) no. 5:** yogurt containers, syrup bottles, ketchup bottles, caps, straws, medicine bottles
- PS (polystyrene) no. 6: disposable plates and cups, meat trays, egg cartons, carry-out containers,
- Miscellaneous no. 7: three and five-gallon water bottles, and certain food containers

RECYCLING CONTAINERS

Every residential property is entitled to (2) recycling containers. A majority received their containers in the initial distribution in 2010. If you have not received your container, you may pick one up at the Township Office, Monday through Friday between the hours of 7:30AM and 3:30PM. Second containers are available and may be picked up during the same times. Please note: recycling containers are issued for the residence. When you move, containers are to be left for the new home owners.

It is not mandatory to use a Township provided recycling container. The only requirement is that any container used for recycling shall be clearly marked 'RECYCLABLES' with letters being at least 4" high and the font be at least ½" wide. This is so the hauler can easily identify the recycling container.

MAKE YOUR HOME THE SOLUTION FOR STORMWATER POLLUTION!

Swimming Pools and Stormwater



Love your pool? *Read on*! We all enjoy a fresh dip in the pool but did you know that the chemicals used to treat your pool to make it clean and safe can have the exact opposite effect on the quality of water in our streams and rivers?

As we head into Spring, it's important to follow these important steps when you open your pool for Summer:

Filter Maintenance

- 1. Do not rinse or clean filters into the street, paved driveways, or a street drain. Do not drain backwash into streets or stormwater drains.
- 2. Rinse cartridge filters into a container and allow the waste to settle out. Dispose of residue by bagging and placing it in the trash after it dries out.



Draining Pools and Hot Tubs:

If you must drain your pool, follow the tips listed below:

Prior to draining, shut off the chlorination system or do not add any chlorine for a minimum of 3 days to allow chlorine to dissipate. Sunlight will help to naturally dissipate the chlorine.

Test the pH of the pool water to ensure it is close to neutral before draining. Adjust pH as necessary.

pH = 7 ↓ ₀ 7 14

Remove excess sediment and leaves from the water.

Drain water onto a landscaped area of your property away from your septic system and away from storm drains. Pool water should not be drained directly into a storm drain or stream.

When draining <u>be considerate</u> of <u>your neighbor</u> by keeping all water on your property. Use sand bags or berms, if necessary, to keep water from leaving your property.

Do not drain if there has been recent application of herbicides, pesticides or fertilizers on your lawn.



If you change your own motor oil in your car or lawn mower, make sure the oil gets disposed of properly. You can drop used oil off for free at AutoZone on Nazareth Pike. Used oil and used filters are accepted at Advance Auto Parts and Wal-Mart; both are located on Nazareth Road, Easton.

ZONING ADMINISTRATOR'S CORNER

DO I NEED A PERMIT FOR ...?

Driveway Permits are <u>required</u>. Any time you create a new driveway, make repairs, repave, resurface, overlay, or reconstruct your driveway, you must apply for a Driveway Permit. Why you ask? So the Township can verify your driveway conforms with the Zoning Ordinance. We also make sure that roadside swales and drainage are maintained. Many times homeowners want to eliminate the swale in their driveway; however, those swales help the water get where it needs to go.





Working from home?

Lower Nazareth Township requires a **Zoning Permit** for a <u>Home-Based Business</u>. This use is limited to persons who are permanent residents of the dwelling, along with a few other requirements such as using less than 25% of their dwelling, and no sign identifying the business. Anything more than this is considered a <u>Home Occupation</u>, which requires Special Exception approval from the Zoning Hearing Board. The cost of the Zoning Permit for a Home-Based Business is a one-time fee of \$75.00. The application form can be found on our website.

<u>Open Burning is prohibited in Lower Nazareth Township</u>, which includes burn piles, burning barrels, etc. Burning is generally only allowed for:

Solely for Cooking Food Agricultural Operations Prevention of a Hazard Firefighter Training Disease or Pest Control Ceremonial Purposes

Burning Permits are only issued for agricultural operations.

If you have an **outdoor kitchen**, **fireplaces or firepit**, we want to stress the following points when we talk about fire safety:

- * Your neighbors may not enjoy smoke blowing into their yard or they may have asthma making it harder for them to breathe. Please <u>be considerate of your neighbors</u> and <u>keep your fire small</u>. The bigger the fire, the greater the potential for disaster.
- * Always keep your fire pit at least 10 feet away from any structure or combustible surface. Pick up leaves and other combustible materials around the pit is important to ensure the fire doesn't accidentally spread.
- * Check the weather forecast before lighting an outdoor fire. Avoid windy conditions that can blow embers.
- * Stay up to date on any burn bans that might be in effect at different times during the year.
- * Always have a container of water nearby and a garden hose on standby <u>before</u> starting the fire.

ZONING ADMINISTRATOR'S CORNER

KNOX BOXES FOR RESIDENTIAL PROPERTIES



In Lower Nazareth Township, most commercial buildings are equipped with Knox Boxes as required by Ordinance. A Knox Box is a small, wall-mounted safe that holds building keys for firefighters and EMT's to retrieve in emergencies. The Knox Boxes are linked via radio to the dispatch station, where the dispatcher can release the keys with DTMF tones allowing emergency response personnel to quickly enter a building without having to force entry. Knox Boxes cut fire losses for building owners since firefighters can

enter buildings without breaking doors or windows.

Residential properties are not required to have a Knox Box in Lower Nazareth Township; however, they are available. If you are frequently out of town or unavailable for an emergency at your home, a Knox Box allows emergency personnel access your property. If you are interested in a residential Knox Box, please contact the Township Office.

DISPLAY YOUR HOUSE NUMBER

Where is your house? I can't find it!

When you look at your home from the street, the most important item you should see is your house number. The delivery man or the person delivering your dinner are not the only people that need to find your house easily. In the event of an emergency, Police, Fire and Ambulance services must be able to find your house quickly, day and night. Your house number should be prominently displayed on your house – not just your mailbox. The numbers should also be reflective or backlit in order to be seen clearly at night. Reflective numbers can be purchased for a few dollars at any home improvement store. Please make sure your house number is visible from the street – *It might save your life! (Zoning Ordinance Article 6, Section 610)*

SELLING YOUR HOME?



Lower Nazareth Township <u>does not</u> require a Certificate of Occupancy for the <u>resale of existing residential property</u> or for a <u>change in tenancy</u>. The inspection requirement is between the seller and buyer, not the Township. However, please remember to complete a Moving Record!

MOVING RECORDS

What is a **Moving Record and why do I need one?** We use a Moving Record to document the names of all individuals—18 years or older - moving in, out or within Lower Nazareth Township for Earned Income Tax collection purposes. The Moving Record can be obtained in person at the Lower Nazareth Township Municipal Building. The cost of the Moving Record is five dollars (\$5). At the time a Moving Record is completed, new residents will also receive a "New Resident Packet" which provides lots of helpful information about living in Lower Nazareth Township. In addition, you may also pick up two recycling cans if they haven't been distributed yet for that property.

RENTAL DISCLOSURE ORDINANCE



If you own real estate and you currently rent your property or plan to do so in the future, every real estate owner who rents or leases all or part of their property is required to provide the Township with a list of all adults who have rented from them for the prior 6 months. It is important for property owners to follow through with providing this information to insure fair and impartial collection of Earned Income Taxes.

ZONING ADMINISTRATOR'S CORNER

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

18045, 18020, 18064 - I'm confused -Do I live in Lower Nazareth Township?

Yes, you do! Many people who move to Lower Nazareth Township get confused about where they live just because of their zip code, and that is understandable. In some larger cities or towns it is common for the municipality to have its own zip code.

However, in Lower Nazareth Township we <u>do not</u> have our own zip code. Mail delivery in Lower Nazareth is routed and delivered from (3) different zip codes: Easton, 18045; Bethlehem, 18020; and Nazareth,18064. Even though you have one of these zip codes, you are still a resident of Lower Nazareth Township.

Does Lower Nazareth Township enforce covenants or deed restrictions?

No, Lower Nazareth Township only enforces its own laws and ordinances. Covenants or deed restrictions are enforced by the property owners in a subdivision or a Homeowner's Association (HOA). We always suggest you review your deed or consult your HOA whenever you are considering an improvement to your property. The Township may approve a permit for fence or shed; however, your HOA may restrict that improvement in another way, such as color, placement or aesthetics.

<u>I'm doing renovations and I need to get a dumpster – Can I store it on the street?</u>

No, we <u>do not</u> allow dumpsters or storage pods to be stored on the streets in Lower Nazareth Township. You must store them on your own property, outside the public right-of-way.

HELPFUL TIPS FROM THE SEWAGE ENFORCEMENT OFFICER

Not everyone is familiar with what needs to be done to maintain their septic system. On-lot septic systems present considerable operation and maintenance responsibilities. We ask that you are kind to your system and remember the following tips:

- √ Protect the primary septic area and the replacement absorption area from earth disturbance.
- √ Keep traffic, equipment, sheds, pools, etc. off your septic tanks and drain fields.
- √ Have your system checked bi-annually by a competent septic system contractor.
- \lor Have your tank pumped every 2-3 years, or as needed.
- \lor Conserve water and avoid heavy peak loads to the system.
- √ Do not dispose of any paper, cloth or fibrous products into your system (cigarettes, diapers, etc.)

PROPERTY MAINTENANCE

The Importance of Swale Maintenance

Residential property owners are familiar with the swales along their front yards and along the streets of residential developments in Lower Nazareth Township. These drainage swales perform a critical function

by channeling stormwater runoff from streets and individual properties. Removing stormwater from the township's streets achieves two benefits:

A primary benefit is increased safety. The swales permit water to flow off the streets and on to their destined drainage basin or water course. This function is extremely important during periods of excessive rainfall and during winter.

The swales help to prevent pavement failure.

Standing water or poor drainage severely impacts the longevity of pavement life.

The most important factor in the long-term success of drainage swales is proper maintenance by individual homeowners.

- Drainage swales must be maintained in a grassed condition, kept free of all obstructions, including but not limited to fill, structures and landscaping materials. Installation of landscaping materials such as decorative rocks, mulch, or plants prevents water from flowing through the swales and could potentially ruin your driveway if the water does not move along to its destination.
- Driveways are designed to accommodate drainage swales as well. Filling in the swaled portion of your driveway blocks stormwater flow and is prohibited by Township ordinances.

Residents should inspect their swales regularly for proper function and remove any impediments that may disrupt the flow of water through them. Any resident with questions about drainage swales should contact the Township Office.

Keep Your Drainage and Utility Easements Free Of Obstructions

Many of the properties in the Township have easements of some sort. Drainage and utility easements, which in many cases run the entire perimeter of the lot, are set aside for drainage and future utility infrastructure installment. Homeowners should be aware that covenants on most recorded subdivision plans prohibit the placement of any obstructions, including but not limited to: fill, temporary or permanent structures, and landscaping materials within these easements.

Please make sure you or your landscaper are aware of any easements on your property prior to placement of any landscaping materials.

What about sprinkler systems or invisible fences in the Road Right-of-Way or an Easement? Because these systems are buried in the ground, many people don't think there is any harm in installing them within an easement or the road right-of-way.

Please note! If those areas need to be accessed by the township, PADOT or a utility company in the future, your sprinkler system or invisible fence will be disturbed and it will be your responsibility to fix it since it should not be there.

PROPERTY MAINTENANCE

Landscaping Q & A

Many people call the township office and ask about regulations for landscaping. The township <u>does not</u> issue permits/regulate landscaping, except where it involves the installation of a patio, retaining wall, re-grading of your property, etc. These items could trigger zoning, building or grading permits.

Several important items to note:



- Don't plant anything that could cause a visibility problem for someone entering or exiting your driveway.
- ♦ Technically, you can plant something right up to a property/easement line. However, common sense should always prevail. When that plant or tree grows over the property line, your neighbor has the right to trim back whatever hangs over the property line (a vertical line up from the property line). Always allow for maturity and growth when you plant so you will be able to maintain your plants and trees yourself.
- If you are unsure if you have an easement, please check your deed or contact the Township directly.

These tips are mostly common sense, but need repeating now and again. If you have any particular questions, please feel free to contact the Township Office.

Sinkhole Repair Tips

As many of our residents already know, Lower Nazareth Township is located in a very sinkhole prone area. This area is prone to sinkholes due primarily to the types of soils and the local geology. Lower Nazareth Township would like to pass along how to address sinkholes you may notice on your property or in the street.



- If you see a sinkhole in the street or directly adjacent to the street, contact the Township Office at your earliest convenience.
- If you think the sinkhole may be a hazard to motorists or pedestrians, and it is not during regular business hours at the Township Office, please contact the police. If it is necessary to contact the police, please use the non-emergency number, 610-759-2200.

*** If at all possible, try to secure the location of the sinkhole until our crew arrives. ***

The township will only service those sinkholes which are located within the township road or the township right-of-way. Any sinkhole outside of those areas is the responsibility of the respective property owner(s). If the sinkhole is determined to be on private property, the property owner will need to take corrective action. That could involve hiring a contractor. To repair a sinkhole, do not put loose soil or course aggregate in the hole. These types of fill will continue to allow water to infiltrate the hole and aggravate the situation. It is best to consult a professional regarding sinkhole repair.

EMERGENCY SERVICES CORNER

MESSAGE FROM CHIEF DEPALMA

If you're like most people, you spend a considerable amount of time driving or riding in a vehicle. Whether it's to or from work, to the store, or just doing the things you enjoy doing, you are probably spending a considerable amount of time driving on the roadways within the Commonwealth. If you do, I'm sure that you have noticed that you share the roadways not only with other vehicles, but with pedestrians, pedal cycles, ATVs, and now most recently "neighborhood electric vehicles". Our department receives numerous inquiries as to whether these vehicles are legally allowed to be on our roadways and what are the rules of the road for these vehicles. Hopefully this addresses any questions you may have. Let's start with definitions.



- Pedestrian: An individual afoot, an individual with a mobility-related disability on a selfpropelled wheelchair, or an electrical mobility device operated by and designated for the exclusive use of an individual with a mobility-related disability.
- Pedal cycle: A vehicle propelled solely by human-powered pedals or a pedal cycle with electric assistance.
- Neighborhood Electric Vehicle: A four-wheeled electric vehicle that has a maximum design speed of not less than 20 miles per hour and of not more than 25 miles per hour.

The Pennsylvania Vehicle Code requires that a pedestrian, in the absence of sidewalks, and shoulder, may walk in the roadway as close to the edge as practicable and must walk on the left side of the roadway facing traffic. This also includes joggers. Vehicles must yield the right of way to any pedestrian within a marked crosswalk, or any unmarked crosswalk at an intersection not controlled by a traffic signal.

The Pennsylvania Vehicle Code requires that any person riding a pedal cycle on a roadway shall be granted all the rights and shall be subject to all the duties applicable to the driver of a vehicle. Meaning, pedal cycles are to be treated like any other vehicle on the roadway, and pedal cycles must obey all the rules of the road that any other vehicle would have to. Pedal cycles must travel in the same lane as all other vehicles traveling in the same direction, are required to travel to the far-right side of the lane they are traveling in, except when turning left, and vehicles when passing a pedal cycle must have a four-foot clearance while passing. When in use between sunrise and sunset, pedal cycles must be equipped on the front with a lamp, with a red reflector facing to the rear and with an amber reflector on each side. Pedal cycles, when traveling on a sidewalk or on a path used by pedestrians, must yield the right of way to the pedestrian and must give an audible signal when overtaking any pedestrian.

The Pennsylvania Vehicle Code requires that any person operating a neighborhood electric vehicle may not be operated upon any highway or roadway with a posted speed limit in excess of 25 miles per hour. Neighborhood Electric Vehicles may only cross a roadway where the posted speed limit is in excess of 35 mph at a signalized intersection. Neighborhood Electric Vehicles must be titled, registered and operators must be licensed. In addition, Neighborhood Electric Vehicles are required to equipped with the following:

- Brakes adequate to control the movement of and to stop the vehicle;
- An odometer;
- A speedometer;
- The original manufacturer's vehicle identification number;
- ♦ A windshield wiper;
- ♦ A horn;
- A battery charge indicator.

A Neighborhood Electric Vehicle is also required to have a safety information decal, affixed in a conspicuous place on the rear of the vehicle, which shall display in prominent lettering "25 MPH Vehicle". The decal shall be at least 4 inches in height and 10 inches in length.

The Pennsylvania Vehicle Code makes it unlawful to operate a snowmobile or an ATV on any street or highway which is not designated and posted as snowmobile or/and ATV road by the governmental agency having jurisdiction. A snowmobile or ATV may cross a roadway only at a 90-degree angle, after coming to a complete stop and after yielding the right-of-way to all oncoming traffic which constitutes an immediate hazard.

There you have it. I hope this cleared things up, and didn't confuse you even more. And if you were wondering, if you are driving any of these with enough alcohol or drugs in your system, you can be arrested and charged with DUI.
